- 2. Next, choose from one of the following prompts, or think of your own.
 - Imagine you are writing for a German newspaper at the end of the First World War. How do you break the news of Germany's defeat to your country?
 - It's the day after the Battle of Hastings. What key facts will the general public want to know?
 - Write some tips for surviving the Blitz in London during the Second World War.
 - You are a reporter for the Roman Army during the Punic Wars. You have just witnessed an elephant being used in combat for the first time. How will you share the news?
 - Your country has just been divided by a new border. Families are split up and there are thousands of refugees. How will you choose to cover such a historic moment?
 - It's the end of the Second World War. Imagine you are a journalist writing for a local newspaper in your hometown. What impact has the war had on your community? Is the mood happy, sad, or something completely different?
 - You are writing the Art Section of the newspaper. Talk about the unveiling of the Bayeux Tapestry showing scenes from the Battle of Hastings.
 - You are recognising soldiers of the Second World War. Tell some of their stories using information from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.
